## ATTENDANCE \& SAFETY

We will maintain our strong focus on improving attendance at College. The agreed college target for each student is attendance above $96.5 \%$. We are pleased that we have seen some improvements throughout this term but the hard work to improve attendance takes individual responsibility. We will be issuing individual recognition of excellent attendance during our rewards assembly on Tuesday $13^{\text {th }}$ of December and continued good attendance is further rewarded with events in and out of college. Importantly, individual attendance targets will be set for students who are working towards the college target of $96.5 \%$. Excellent attendance is so crucial, not only for academic progress but also to support mental health and wellbeing. Please continue to send your children to school every day.

## Infectious diseases

We would like to take this opportunity to remind you of the signs, symptoms and the actions to be taken if you think that you or your child might have scarlet fever. Scarlet fever is a common childhood infection caused by Streptococcus pyogenes or group A Streptococcus (GAS).

As a college we have taken action and we can reassure you that we have initiated routine infection control. The main actions include routine handwashing and "Catch it Bin it Kill it". All students and staff have been briefed on the responsibility to maintain infection control.

It is not usually serious but should be treated with antibiotics to reduce the risk of complications (such as pneumonia) and spread to others. The early symptoms of scarlet fever include sore throat, headache, fever, nausea and vomiting. After 12 to 48 hours, the characteristic red rash develops, usually first on the chest and stomach, then rapidly spreading to other parts of the body, making the skin have a sandpaper like feel to it. The scarlet rash may be harder to spot on darker skin, although the 'sandpaper' feel should be present. Patients usually have flushed red cheeks.

They may also have a bright red 'strawberry' tongue. If you think you, or your child, might have scarlet fever contact your GP or NHS 111 as soon as possible.

Firstly, make sure that you or your child take(s) the full course of any antibiotics prescribed. Although you or your child will feel better soon after starting the course of antibiotics, you must complete the course to ensure that you do not carry the bacteria in your throat after you have recovered.

Secondly, stay at home, away from college or work for at least 24 hours after starting the antibiotic treatment, to avoid spreading the infection. You can help stop the spread of infection through frequent hand washing and by not sharing eating utensils, clothes, bedding and towels.

Additionally, all contaminated tissues should be disposed of immediately. The same bacteria which cause scarlet fever can also cause a range of other types of infection such as skin infections (impetigo) and a sore throat.

## ENGINEERING ENTERPRISE CLUB

The Engineering Enterprise club has raised $£ 401.19$ since mid-September plus $£ 40.00$ in WW1 Tommy's for the Royal British Legion Poppy appeal.

Here are some of the items our students have produced whilst attending the club. Order can be placed with our reception team.


Y10 health students were lucky enough to have another visit by Deb from the Haxby Group this week. This session was all about infection control, a very topical subject at the moment! Deb started the session with a bowl of flour, which she invited all students to put their hands in. Once hands were sufficiently 'floured' the students were given a job to do, 'tidy the desk' and 'tend to a patient' were some of the tasks. We got flour everywhere, but this showed us just how easily infection can spread by touch. Deb shared an informative presentation which covered the methods of infection of various bacteria, viruses, fungi and parasites before we moved on to washing our hands. The group was split into two, with one group let loose with the neon yellow poster paint and the other with some 'wash and glow' UV germ lotion. Students with the yellow paint were asked to wash their hands with it, we then examined the spread of the paint on their hands to see how effective, or ineffective, their cleaning was. The UV group rubbed the lotion into their hands before heading to the toilets to give them a thorough wash. On return, we looked at their hands under the UV lamp...there were still germs!

## MATHEMATICS

On Wednesday our Year 9 students joined Zoe Griffiths to explore all mathematical and festive things. In this virtual session, students took part in a magic trick linked to Christmas crackers, using a famous mathematical theorem in a hands-on activity making cut-out decorations, and played a festive lottery with the chance to win a prize.

Students were introduced to mathematical ideas that were unfamiliar to them (e.g. the Fold and Cut theorem). Seeing maths being used in new ways was the goal of the session and engaged and surprised all students. Brilliant work everyone.
