#### **TECHNICAL EXCELLENCE**

News from programmable systems this week.

Year 9 have reached their first milestone in the year this week; I am very impressed with their achievements within the foundation for programmable systems - some excellent programming showcase documents, and also with skills development in the electronics workshop using solderless breadboards, LED's, resistors and multimeters for measuring voltages. We will see our young professionals continuing on their learning journey after half-term, with some joining other pathways, and I wish them well! For those students remaining on the Foundation year in Programmable Systems, the next steps will involve you designing and then manufacturing your own printed circuit board, and you will be putting into action a lot of the things you have 'had a go' with in the first half term - exciting times ahead!

Year 10 students have completed their first half term as well and have been learning about programmable systems and how they are communicated and designed to begin with using block diagrams. Our next stages for the GCSE students is to now select some inputs and outputs for our Programmable Temperature Warning system - and then to begin some programming sequences; as this task changes each year, it is always a new challenge and I enjoy discussing what things the students may want to make their warning system work. The great thing about it being a practical application of programming is we have to create a physical model of a temperature-controlled environment, which learners will have to download their code in to - and then test it. The interesting stuff then happens when, guess what - we don't get exactly what we programmed - and then begins the good part - technical excellence - when we see problem solving, resilience, and creative thinking to debug and amend and modify code to get the intended outcome - with a real-life system.

### **WORK EXPERIENCE WEEK**

Our Year 11 and Year 13 students have also had a great experience this week while undertaking their work experience placements. Teachers have visited organisations to check that staff and students are happy, with some great positive feedback from employers received. Is it wonderful for teachers to see students in a workplace environment successfully working with adults they did not know until a few days before, and enthusiastically undertaking real world tasks. Work experience placements only take place in one week of Year 10-13, but the experience truly develops students employability skills.









## YEAR 9 VISIT TO CU SCARBOROUGH

This week our Year 9 students visited CU Scarborough for workshops focussing on our three curriculum pathways - Engineering, Cybersecurity and Health. Within the Engineering workshop students were set a mathematical, resourcing and finance, and practical electronics task; the Health workshop involved a quiz and CPR competition, and within the Cyber workshop students had to work in teams to 'Crack the Code'. Students commented:

"I particularly enjoyed the Cracking the Code activity! It's made me think about doing Cybersecurity and CU in the future."

"I really liked doing the Health CPR challenge competition, the session made me realise how many different jobs there re in Health that I can study at CU."

"It was really interesting doing the wiring engineering activity, but it was challenging. It's made me realise how much maths there is in engineering."

Overall the students had a great morning with CU Scarborough tutors commenting that our Year 9 students were a credit to the UTC due to their conduct and engagement.








# **YEAR11 ENGLISH LITERATURE**


#### **DYSON INSTITUTE VISIT**

### **ATTENDANCE**

It is very important to ensure that all medical and illness absences are reported daily by parents using our absence line or enquiries to Miss. Brown our Attendance and Data Manager.

Attendance will always be a continual reminder. Excellent attendance is above 96.5%. It is important that all students work hard to continually improve, this contributes significantly to maintain and improve overall progress and attainment. All students with 100% receive 10 professional points per week. Student above the 96.5 target receive 5 points per week.

Attendance monitoring and formal procedures are followed robustly. We work closely with NYCC attendance team to address attendance concerns at the earliest stage.

### **REWARDS AND ATTENDANCE REWARDS**

Assembly this week focussed on rewards and recognition. The poems "IF" by Rudyard Kipling and "Man in a Glass" by "Peter Wimbrow Snr. Both Poems focus on personal integrity and are a very worthwhile read.

Over £50 of vouchers were issued for attendance and professional conduct. We have had a great response this year to the weekly PVES rewards, so we look forward to recognising students with excellent attendance and a professional working attitude over the course of this Autumn half –term. Over the course of the half term 13 495 positive professional points were issued by all staff, this is an average of 154 per student.

Student's positives are identified and can be viewed on BROMCOM MCAS. The points identify the elements of our college ethos and that of being a "Young Professional". We encourage

students to review progress regularly. Each week reward vouchers are issued in assembly to recognise achievement and hard work.

## **PHYSICAL EDEUCATION**

Full PE kit is required for all. If a student is medically excused, please notify enquiries. Should a student be medically excused they are required to change in full, their lesson is then adjusted to include personal, professional and leadership development.

# **LOCKERS AND MOBILE DEVICES**

Each student has been assigned a locker and this must be used to store all bags, equipment, and mobile devices. Students do require a padlock.

Use of padlocks provides essential security for valuable items including mobile devices, smart watches and ear buds etc. Storing mobile devices correctly in the locker prevents confiscation in line with our policy. On the first occasion the device is stored and returned at the end of the day. Each subsequent occasion, the device is collected by parents. To prevent

inconvenience and control access to on- line apps, please ensure padlocks are available and devices are stored correctly.

Mobile device procedures protect students from on-line access and messaging throughout the day to ensure focus is on College work, social interaction and the break and lunch activities that provide opportunities for mental and physical well-being.
