

## Y9 ENGINEERING FLAMINGOLAND VISIT

The first cohort of our Y9 engineering students visited Flamingoland this week, but not with a focus of going on rides or visiting zoo animals. The rides are currently closed for the winter so that essential maintenance can take place, which gave a fabulous opportunity for our students to get a closer look at how they operate and function. The two rides reviewed were Velocity and the Froghopper, both of which have a wealth of engineering knowledge to learn from including electrical sensors, pneumatic and hydraulic control systems. Students were able to walk underneath and alongside ride tracks to get close up to the engineering behind ride operation and function. This knowledge will be applied in the New Year when students will be undertaking a fairground ride design and development project. 
## EMPLOYER CELEBRATION EVENT

## SCIENCE

We are getting our Year 9 scientists where we want them to be: able to design an investigation, devise a method, collect data and then interpret it. We also looked at the historical records of the Great Fire of London to write up a scientific report on the devastation it caused as well as how we use different types of fire extinguishers today to tackle different types of fires.

We will be serving Christmas Dinner for students on Thursday 14<sup>th</sup> December. There are menus up around school so that students can see what is included, and this will be the usual cost of £2.35 for a main course, or £2.65 for a main course and pudding. Students may also wear their Christmas jumper this day if they wish, for a £1 donation. All other uniform rules still apply, the jumper is an option instead of their blazer.

## SUTC COMBINED CADET FORCE ROYAL NAVY

As we draw towards the end of 2023, I am pleased to say that the cadets have thus far had a great start to the first third of this academic year.

This year has been the first year that the cadets have represented the UTC in a Public Military event in the form of two Remembrance Day events. The cadets were impeccably turned out and did not only themselves and the college proud but you the parents too. Without your support we cannot support some of the community-based events so I would like to say on behalf of the adult staff thank you.

Most of the uniform order has now been received and some of you will have noticed the uniforms coming home with the cadets.

I would ask that you encourage your child/ward to maintain their own uniform and look after it. They will not need to be washed every week as they are particularly hard wearing, and cadets should wear a navy blue or black t-shirt under the PCS top. When washing, please do so inside out as this helps to maintain the integrity of the garments.

Sizes have always been an issue for many cadets, and I would like to take this opportunity to remind cadets and yourselves that these are genuine Royal Navy uniforms known as PCS which are the mainstay of the working rig worn by all ranks and rates. As the RN have now changed from the navy blue to now black, we as a cadet organisation are now using what is left of the old PCS. To this end there is only a certain amount of uniform that is going to be left over so it is vital that cadets look after their uniforms as once issued it is very difficult and very expensive to replace lost kit. To supply Number three uniform which is the white shirt, tie and black trousers and then the PCS shirt and trousers, with belts and ties cost in the region of £200 per cadet. We supply these uniforms free of charge, but they do remain the property of the Royal Navy and CCF.

Some of the uniforms may be a little on the big size. We cannot control this as there are only certain sizes. Wonderweb is a great asset to shorten trousers. We remind the cadets that

this is work rig, not for a fashion parade so please make the best of the sizes that are given. We concentrate on turn appearance, not on baggy clothes as we understand this cannot be helped sometimes.

Cadets will need to make sure that they have black boots. This is all we ask you as parents to provide. If you are not able to provide boots please contact me and I will see what we can do. We have some spares, but these will be first come first serve basis.

Cadets will also need a shoe/boot polish kit. I am going to put a centrally held kit together to be held in my office and cadets can see me on a Friday morning to borrow this if they do not have their own. If Santa could bring them all a shoe polish kit that would be very helpful.

Shirts and trousers MUST be ironed. Boots MUST be polished. We encourage the cadets to do a buddy check prior to parade. This is going to be more important as we move forward into next year. I am going to run a polishing and ironing masterclass in the new year.

The drill practices the cadets are doing together with their new uniforms will transform their whole cadet experience and hopefully help develop their commitment to their teams and in turn their own confidence and skill base.

The ultimate aim therefore with drill, uniform, and teamwork is for next year for the whole contingent, some 52 cadets now, to take part in the Armed Forces Day March Past and join the Scarborough Sea Cadets to display their pride and skills as an excellent Contingent.

I am on with the administration for Armed Forces Day, Remembrance Sunday and Afloat Activities at Wykeham Lakes between April and October whereby Sailing, Kayaking, Mountain Biking and other activities will be provided, again free of charge throughout the Afloat Season. I am hoping to arrange a Summer Camp which will probably be towards the end of the academic year which will entail some costs, but I am hoping to keep these to a minimum.

To this end, could I ask you as parents/carers of the cadets to encourage cadets to practice their swimming where the cadet is not confident as ALL cadets MUST pass the swim test before they can take part in afloat activities. The cadets must be able to swim 40 metres and tread water for 3 minutes. This may entail a little more practice, but could I ask you to support the cadets to get to the pool and practice to help them when time comes for them to do the swim test.

This week we have a number of cadets missing due to work experience, so we are going to be running a catch-up session with regards the Royal Navy Training Syllabus. We hope to get all the cadets through the first rank syllabus and get them a promotion which helps boost confidence and motivation but is also allows us to concentrate more on the afloat activities during the summer months.

We will finish next week with the completion of the Submarine Escape experience delivered by S/Lt Sowersby (an experienced submariner of many years). This gives the cadets an understanding of some of the skills required for working for months on end beneath the waves on a Nuclear Powered Submarine.

Thank you once again to you the parents for your ongoing support. Without you supporting the cadets we cannot help to drive the contingent forward into what has been described during a recent biennial inspection as a leading example of a cadet contingent for the Royal Navy.

Thank you. I hope that you and the cadets have a fabulous Christmas, and the cadets return ready for more fun and skill-based activities as we head towards and active and fruitful 2024.

## ATTENDANCE

As we approach the Christmas break it is vital to maintain excellent attendance. It is very important to ensure that all medical and illness absences are reported daily by parents using our absence line or enquiries to Miss. Brown our Attendance and Data Manager. Should you make a call for a reported student illness– please expect a phone call back from the attendance team to check details and provide support as required.

Attendance will always be a continual reminder. Excellent attendance is above 96.5%. It is important that all students work hard to continually improve, this contributes significantly to maintain and improve overall progress and attainment. All students with 100% receive 10 professional points per week. Student above the 96.5 target receive 5 points per week.

Attendance monitoring and formal procedures are followed robustly. We work closely with NYCC attendance team to address attendance concerns at the earliest stage.

## SAFEGUARDING

It is essential for safeguarding purposes that Lanyards and identity cards are always worn. Should cards become lost or damaged these must be replaced. Replacements can be purchased via parent pay. Lanyards are required for identification for all working staff within the building. Students who forget such items must sign into college manually and this adds to workload. It is our student's responsibility to ensure they are prepared for each day.

All students who have poor punctuality and fail to bring a lanyard receive immediate negative stages – these cumulatively result in Lunch time detentions.

### PHYSICAL EDEUCATION

Full PE kit is required for all. If a student is medically excused, please notify enquiries. Should a student be medically excused they are required to change in full, their lesson is then adjusted to include personal, professional and leadership development.

### ORGANISATION AND EQUIPMENT

Being prepared and study ready includes equipment. Carrying the correct equipment and the stationery for each day is essential – a reading book, a clear pencil case with a pencil, black and green pens, ruler, maths equipment and importantly, a scientific calculator and college water bottle.

## LOCKERS AND MOBILE DEVICES

Each student has been assigned a locker and this must be used to store all bags, equipment, and mobile devices.

Use of padlocks provides essential security for valuable items including mobile devices, smart watches and ear buds etc. Storing mobile devices correctly in the locker prevents confiscation in line with our policy. On the first occasion the device is stored and returned at the end of the day. Each subsequent occasion, the device is collected by parents. To prevent inconvenience and control access to on- line apps, please ensure padlocks are available and devices are stored correctly.

Mobile device procedures protect students from on-line access and messaging throughout the day to ensure focus is on College work, social interaction and the break and lunch activities that provide opportunities for mental and physical well-being.
